

What's in the bond?

What do building updates mean for student success?

This bond measure would allow the district to raise \$75.51 million for proposed projects. By voting YES, you will ensure the district also receives over \$5.8 million in matching funds through the Oregon School Capital Improvement Matching (OSCIM) Program.

ALL SCHOOLS

Proposed projects include updates to building security and safety standards at all 12 of our school sites. Healthy, safe schools allow students to focus on growing basic learning skills instead of worrying about threats to their safety or being too distracted by overheated or frigid classrooms.

FOCUS ON LEARNING

\$49.8 million will be spent on these upgrades throughout the district. To put this into perspective, a new elementary school that serves 600 students would cost an estimated \$47.45 million. Our district currently serves about 2,670 elementary students.

HIGH SCHOOL

The bond also calls for new learning space at Roseburg High School, attended by 1,600 students each year. Nearly every student attending schools in our district will eventually use this space.

STUDENT CAREER PREP

\$31.5 million will be spent to replace the Old Main at RHS, which was built about 100 years ago. Nearly all classes were moved out of the Old Main this school year because the facility is no longer considered safe for students and staff. The new facility will expand space for quality learning and additional job-skill programs.
